My dear friends

The situation in England is alarming- so many new cases of COVID-19 and so many deaths. Let us not forget to keep in our prayers all those who are affected. Those who grieve for a loved one, those who wait anxiously for better news of loved ones seriously ill. I keep you all in my thoughts and prayers and I really hope and pray that you are doing everything you can to keep safe and well.

Here in St Teresa's, we have done all we can to make sure the church is properly stewarded and sanitized. But of course, each person who comes to mass must follow the guidelines very strictly-wear a mask, sanitise their hands, leave the church immediately after the mass. Our stewards are also working really hard to ensure that everyone can worship as safely as possible. However, if you feel that you are especially vulnerable or shielding or even if you feel uncomfortable to come during this third lockdown, when the virus is spreading so quickly, please do remain at home. The Bishop's Conference of England and Wales has clearly stated that there is no obligation to attend Mass on Sunday during these testing times. Do not forget that you can attend mass online and of course pray in the peace and quiet of your own home. Perhaps the weekly reflections in the newsletter may be of help?

Today, Sunday 17th January, we start the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. The Gospel (John 1: 35-42) begins with John's testimony about Jesus. *As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, 'Look, there is the lamb of God.'* Jesus has just been baptized by John and he is beginning to gather followers. His first followers sought him out because of the witness and testimony of John the Baptist. The gospel recounts the calling of the first disciples.

I think this is such a beautiful Gospel. John points now to Jesus as the Lamb of God and the disciples simply follow him. Just like that? They did not know him but perhaps they felt his mysteriously attractive power. Jesus turns and asks them a question. 'What do you want?' And they say, 'Where do you live?' 'Come and see' is the answer.



It could read as 'Come, and you will see' because it will take them a lifetime to discover who Jesus is — 'the one who is closest to the Father's Heart.' This is a life-changing moment for the disciples. They meet Jesus and everything changes. And notice that Jesus does not answer their question with a lecture or a lot of words. He invites them into a relationship. Come and see... They do come and their life changes forever.

We too are invited into that relationship. Do not forget that the Gospel speaks to us today. Jesus is as present to us today as he was to the first disciples. So that question 'What are you looking for?' is addressed to you and to me today. It is a very searching question. What are the deepest longings of our hearts? Perhaps we can take some time this week to reflect on that question and to share the answer with Jesus.

Jesus turns round and looks at the two disciples. That verb really means to 'look inside', He looks inside their hearts, their souls. His heart and his eyes change the life of both disciples. He is God incarnate, Emmanuel- God with us.

'No one has ever seen God; it is the only Son, who is nearest to the Father's heart, who has made him known' (John 1: 18). He, who is nearest the Father's heart, has come to be close to each one of us. How much comfort and consolation does that give us in these awful times of the COVID-19 pandemic when we might be tempted to feel alone and abandoned. No, we are not alone. Jesus is Emmanuel-God with us, forever and no matter what is happening.

And that is not all. The disciples are invited to stay with him, 'Come and see'. That invitation is also offered to us. We are invited to stay with Jesus- forever. Let us take time this week to be still, to be quiet and to allow him to enter our hearts and to stay with us. I am convinced that only his presence can bring us the peace, comfort and healing that each one of us longs for. Andrew was so excited and joyful at this meeting that he could not wait to tell his brother Simon and bring him to Jesus. (And notice that Jesus also looks 'into' Simon and changes his life forever- he calls him Peter and we know the end of that story!)

How can we bring people to Jesus? During this third lockdown, we do not have much opportunity to meet others. But through our prayer we can bring people to Jesus. We can name them and ask him to shower his healing and his blessings on them. We must never underestimate the power of prayer.

Please do stay safe this week. I end with this lovely little prayer that you might perhaps find helpful for this week. (It is from an unknown source)

O Lord Jesus Christ,
stay beside me to defend me,
within me to guide me,
before me to lead me,
behind me to guard me,
and above me to bless me;
that with you and in you
I may live and moveand have my being,
for ever and ever. Amen.

School Site for Sale

Since the closure of the school during the Summer the question of what is to happen with the site on which it stood has come sharply into focus. The Diocese needs to sell the site and wishes to ensure that the Parish continues to flourish into the future. The Parish Buildings & Finance Committee (Fr Lijo, Dcn Seán, John Bolton, Miles Cunningham & Nick Jepson) have made clear to the Diocese our concerns that for the parish to flourish we need similar facilities to the Walsingham Hall and Clubroom if the Hall and Clubroom have to be included in the sale to make the site viable for a purchaser/developer. We have been in discussion with Tony McNiff, Chief Operations Officer of the Diocese, and the Vicar General, Mgr Seán Healy, who has assured us that, "the parish will be consulted as the redevelopment progresses and that sufficient provision for social and outreach facilities will be provided, so that the parish may continue its mission in years to come."

We are sure that the spirit of open communication and co-operation will continue as plans are developed over the coming months. There will be many concerns and points of view for consideration and the Parish Buildings & Finance Committee are very happy to listen to any questions or views you may wish to make known to them – their contact details are listed below. The committee will continue to keep the parish up to date as and when plans and decisions are made. In the meantime, do not be alarmed by the appearance of a "For Sale" sign in the Car Park.
