This Sunday is the third Sunday of Ordinary Time. In 2019, Pope Francis announced that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time would be celebrated as the Sunday of the Word of God. Pope Francis is encouraging all of us to place Sacred Scripture at the heart and centre of our lives- Sacred Scripture is such an integral part of our faith, for God speaks to each one of us personally through Scripture.

We hear the beautiful and inspiring words of Scripture each time we come to mass. I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of all of us to thank our fantastic team of readers, who prepare so carefully every week to make sure that the Word of God is proclaimed clearly and so meaningfully.

In the Apostolic Letter 'Aperuit illis' Pope Francis writes, 'May we never tire of devoting time and prayer to Scripture, so that it may be received "not as a human word but as what it really is, the word of God" (1 Thess 2:13).'

I would like to encourage us all to take time in the coming days and weeks to spend a little bit of time each day praying with the Scriptures, because in doing so I am convinced that we will come closer and closer to Jesus. I particularly love these words from the letter to the Hebrews (4:12-13), 'The word of God is something alive and active: it cuts like any double-edged sword but more finely: it can slip through the

place where the soul is divided from the spirit, or joints from the marrow; it can judge the secret emotions and thoughts.'

When we pray with Scripture, Jesus is so present to us. Of course, he is always present, but in a special way in the Scriptures and those beautiful words of Scripture can comfort us, heal us, encourage us, console us, challenge us and bring us closer and closer to his loving heart. Jesus is the Word of God, Word mad flesh for the salvation of the world.

One lovely way of praying with Scripture is Lectio Divina. Some of you may already use this way of

This Sunday's Gospel comes from the beginning of Mark (1:34-20). It tells the story of the call of the first four disciples- Mark's version is not the same as John's (Last week's Gospel). In Mark's account, we see Jesus taking the initiative and calling them, 'Follow me and I will make you into fishers of men.' They leave everything immediately to be with Jesus. Perhaps during this week, we might leave everything too, just for a short time to be with Jesus and to allow him to enter our hearts and to speak to us. I really love the Psalm for this week (Psalm 25).

Lord, make me know your ways.

Lord, teach me your paths.

Make me walk in your truth and teach me:

For you are God my saviour.

Remember your mercy, Lord

And the love you have shown from of old.

In your love remember me,

Because of your goodness, O Lord.

The Lord is good and upright.

He shows the path to those who stray,

He guides the humble in the right path,

He teaches his way to the poor.

Let us stay with these words – they are so encouraging because they assure us that with our hand in God's hand, we will never go astray. He will always bring us back and guide us on the right path. We too, like the psalmist, might say to the Lord, *In your love remember me, because of your goodness*.

Of course, the Lord never forgets us, never! But, like the psalmist, we might sometimes feel that he has, especially in these testing times. Let us, then, ask him to remember us. Let us call upon his love and his tenderness. Let us ask him to remember our families and friends and all those who are suffering because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Let us ask him to remember our poor, suffering world. And then, let us just bask in his loving reassuring presence.

I wish you all a beautiful week praying with the Scriptures and I really pray that you will feel consoled and encouraged and be filled with hope and joy.
