My dear parishioners

There is no doubt that we are living in testing times. The virus continues to circulate and, in many

countries, daily infection rates are reaching record levels. Governments are frantically trying to

curb the spread of the Covid 19 by imposing lockdowns again, or 'firebreak lockdowns' or

curfews or three tier restrictions as we have here in England. I think it is good to remember in

our prayers all those who have died from this virus, those who are suffering from the effects, at

home or in hospital and of course all those who have lost their jobs.

Today is the 30th Sunday in ordinary Time and the Gospel comes from Matthew 22: 34-40. Once

again, we see that, just like in last Sunday's gospel, the Pharisees are playing games with Jesus

and trying to catch him out and to score points. When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had

silenced the Sadducees they got together, and to disconcert them, one of them put a question:

'Master, which is the greatest commandment of the Law?'

In the Jewish Law there were more than 600 commandments so they wanted to see which he

would choose and if they could prove him wrong. Jesus is well aware of their intentions and he

answers with complete authority. 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with

all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. The second

commandment resembles it. You must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two

commandments hang the whole law and the Prophets also.' Jesus is saying that the greatest

commandment is love. Loving God and loving our neighbour are inseparable. We cannot love

God and then refuse to love our neighbour.

And Jesus is inviting us to love according to the measure of his own love. He lived out the law of

love. He never allowed the laws of religion to overtake the need for love. He always put his Father

first and would spend long hours alone with God in prayer. It was from those special moments

that he received the guidance, wisdom and strength that he needed to fulfil his mission. And we

know from the gospels that he had so many beautiful encounters with those who needed his

healing, his forgiveness, his mercy, his acceptance. We know that his love changed people's lives.

He loved even to giving his life for us. This message of Jesus covers all our relationships. We are invited to love as Jesus did. To love God with our whole being. To put him first in our lives. To reach out to everyone we meet, to offer them compassion, kindness, gentleness, to do whatever we can to help them. And to do all that with love. For as St Paul says in 1 Cor 13:1, if I don't have love I am 'only a resounding gong or a clanging symbol'. What an awful noise that would make. As we know it is not easy to live like Jesus. We fail many times. Let us ask for the grace to put on his heart and mind – to become more and more like him so as to make our world a better place.

I would just like to pick out one small phrase in this gospel that I feel is often forgotten. Love your neighbour as yourself. How difficult it can be to love ourselves. Sometimes we can be our own very harsh critics. Sometimes we forget to be kind and merciful to ourselves. We can't forgive ourselves for past mistakes. We do not value ourselves enough. We criticise ourselves and judge ourselves very harshly. We need to remember that nothing we can do that can make God love us more. He loves us exactly as we are. He created us in love. He values us, so why should we not value ourselves.

Let us also ask the grace to see ourselves and love ourselves as God does. There are beautiful words in the book of the Prophet Jeremiah 31:3. God speaks and says: I have loved you with an everlasting love. Sometimes it can be helpful to say these words over and over again. God says to me 'I have loved you with an everlasting love.'

For me this is a beautiful gospel with such a powerful and hopeful message -love. I am great believer in 'One Day, One step at a time'. What does loving God mean today & How can I put that into practise? What does loving others mean today & How can I put that into practise? What does loving myself mean today & How can I put that into practise?

I want to end this reflection with two lines from the Responsorial Psalm (psalm 17) from this Sunday's liturgy. Words that can give us courage and comfort when we feel afraid, upset, discouraged. Words to remind us that God will never let us down.

My God is the rock where I take refuge;

My shield, my mighty help, my fortress.

Stay safe this week. May God bless you all
